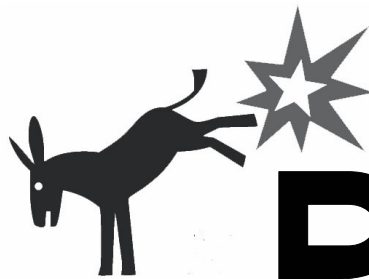

In Memory of State Senator Scott White, 46th District

On October 21st of this year, we lost Senator Scott White at the age of 41. He was working – attending a convention in order to learn more about Seattle’s economy and to gain ideas for future legislation - when he died due to a fatal cardiac event. I know that many in the 34th Legislative District knew Scott and have already reached out to his family. A memorial fund (see information below) has been set up for his children, ages 5 and 3, and I know his wife, Alison, is finding support through family and friends.

I first met Scott White at the King County Council when I went to work for Dow in late 2001. He moved from budget policy staff to eventually becoming Chief of Staff to the entire Council. Working for 13 members, who were being downsized to 9 members, was not an easy job – yet he managed it well. Then, Scott moved on to work for Executive Sims and our paths parted for a period of time.

In 2008, after I had been in the House of Representatives for a year, Scott joined me as a colleague in Olympia. He was as hard charging as ever – working for smart growth policies, transit and what was best for his Seattle constituents. Amazingly, we both then moved to the Senate this past year and worked together on the Transportation Committee to improve transit, hold the 520 and viaduct projects accountable, and to try to protect a progressive agenda. As Vice-Chair of the Transportation Committee and as Majority Whip, Scott had already put his “imprint” on the Senate in just a year’s time.

His loss is a shock for all of us in the legislature and is a loss for the 34th Legislative District as well. Scott was a solid Democrat, working hard, and always looking to do the best for the State and his constituents. He will be missed.

King County Democrats Meeting Report

Our meeting began soulfully, with remembrances of Senate Majority Whip Scott White, who died on October 17 at the age of 41. Many of us knew Scott; I had the honor of serving on the King County Legislative Action Committee when he was a co-chair, and he led our group in a way that made us proud to be Democrats. To share some of our thoughts this evening: Scott "worked until the end on a progressive agenda." He was a "leader and a mentor" who was "going places." For many, "this is the Party that Scott built." He was a man of action: "This is a problem; let's find a solution." "He listened to everyone, no matter who they were." He was "an example of what one person can do." His loss is devastating to the 46th District and to our state. We chose to donate as a body to a fund for his children's education, in appreciation of all his work for us.

We moved on to discuss how we will fill his empty Senate seat. In the 34th we have been through a similar process when a Senate seat was vacated, although not under such tragic circumstances. The 46th will convene a special meeting of their PCOs on Nov. 10 when they will 3 names and carry those forward to members of King County Democrats, who will that same night vote on confirming these nominations. Since it is likely one or both of their elected state representatives will be selected, they will then have a House seat to fill. We are working fast to ensure that both these seats are filled with solid, progressive Democrats before the January session begins.

"Take Back the Legislature" is the vision of a new campaign dedicated to seeing that we, the people, regain control from corporate interests. Tim Eyman plans to put forward another initiative 1053, which now requires a 2/3 majority to pass any taxes. Currently, we cannot even close tax loopholes without a supermajority. The new campaign would enact tax exemption reform; business and corporate exemptions would have to be prioritized, just as state needs currently are. They would be ranked, along with education, transportation, the environment, and only passed through if they were higher ranking. Our communications team at King County is working to obtain poll data on how to best get our message about this out before the 2012 election.

The 34th LD was recognized for our outstanding Get Out the Vote day 10/23. Our chair Tim Nuse described what we had done – how we got out over 60 volunteers to walk precincts, and how

we made the afternoon exciting and fun for everyone. Other districts discussed their actions. One mentioned trying Smart Phones tied to VoteBuilder; imagine inputting data the instant you doorbell – technology that is coming to us soon!

We passed resolutions in Support of Occupy Seattle and Requiring Seattle Police Officers to Wear Body Cameras While on Duty. As a grand finale, the resolution we had passed in the 34th at our last meeting, "In Support of ILWU Local 21," came to the body from the Platform and Resolutions Committee as a controversial resolution, with a recommendation to table it for another month because of concern over news stories talking of violent actions by union members. However, in a brilliant display of teammanship, Tim Nuse, Max Vekich, and Betsy Shedd spoke out strongly in favor, and the resolution passed, a great end to a truly memorable evening. Our actions served to move us full circle in another tribute to our friend, Scott White, whose spirit permeated the meeting. We will miss him, but his mission is ours: We must move forward.

I keep my fingers crossed that she and I will continue to be gainfully employed and that Obama will sign new rules to ease the repayment terms for college graduates with federal student loans. Every little bit helps. I've felt the change. How about you?

Resolution in Support of ILWU Local 21

The following resolution was approved by the membership at our October 12 membership meeting:

WHEREAS, the 34th District Democrats is committed to the principles of social justice and equity; and

WHEREAS, the members of this body recognize that longshore workers affiliated with the International Longshore and Warehouse Union (ILWU) Local 21 in Longview, Washington are under attack by employer EGT Development for standing up for their jobs and their rights; and

WHEREAS, EGT Development is a multinational, joint venture of Japan based Itochu Corp, South Korea's STX Pan Ocean and Bunge North America; and

WHEREAS, Bunge Grain alone operates in more than 30 countries and profited \$2.5 billion in 2010; and

WHEREAS, EGT promised good jobs and got a special state tax exemption and a sweetheart lease deal from the public Port of Longview to build a \$200 million grain terminal on port property; and

WHEREAS, ILWU Local 21 longshore workers have performed all longshore work on Port of Longview property for nearly 80 years; and

WHEREAS, EGT Development has walked away from its promise to longshore workers and collective bargaining negotiations with ILWU Local 21; and

WHEREAS, after many months of negotiations, EGT Development refused to agree to the Grainhandlers Agreement even though ILWU Local 21 was willing to modify the agreement to meet EGT Development's particular needs; and

WHEREAS, EGT Development is trying to disrupt the positive relationship that the ILWU has in every other export grain terminal; and

WHEREAS, ILWU Local 21 dockworkers are being arrested and subjected to unfair and retaliatory police action for exercising their free speech and associational rights under the United States Constitution to protest EGT Development's actions;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED That the 34th District Democrats stand in solidarity with the workers of ILWU Local 21 in holding EGT accountable for promises made during collective bargaining negotiations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 34th District Democrats send a letter of support to ILWU Local 21, with copies sent to the Washington State Labor Council, the 34th District state delegation, our federal delegation; and our Governor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the 34th District Democrats forward this resolution to the King County Democrats for passage, and to the Washington State Democratic Central Committee for passage. If passage is approved, we request that these organizations also send letters of support to those listed above.

In Case You Missed Our Last Meeting. . .

The main business of the October meeting was the upcoming election. Walk lists were available as well as 34th District voting guides listing our endorsements, and role playing exercises for PCO and volunteer doorbelling.

West Seattle Food Bank

Mike Wald of the West Seattle Food Bank spoke about the challenges facing our hungry neighbors. The number of families per month that need help has jumped from 1,000 to 1,700 at a time when federal funding has been wiped out.

International Longshore and Warehouse Union Update

Max Vekich gave us the latest on the labor dispute between the ILWU and several large multinational corporations at the Port of Longview which could impact grain terminals all along the Washington coast. EGT violated its lease agreement with the Port of Longview in which the company committed to hire longshore workers. These are good paying jobs and under the state constitution, port authorities should give priority to local unions and communities. Later in the meeting Max and Marcee Stone presented a resolution addressing this matter. The resolution, printed on page 5 passed unanimously.

On the Spot Recognition

Tim Nuse was recognized for his hard work in keeping the 34th District Democrats running smoothly.

Call to Action

Statistics prove that having a Precinct Committee Officer in a precinct increases turnout: all of the seven precincts with the highest turnout (57.2%) in the district have a PCO; of the bottom seven (22.5%), only two had PCOs. We have 197 precincts with 76,000 registered voters. We have printed 7,000 voter guides and will deliver them to likely Democrats. If we walk 60 precincts, we'll earn thousands of votes. If we walk all of our precincts we'll earn tens of thousands of votes. A day of celebration and precinct walking is planned for October 23 at Youngstown Cultural Center with lunch, guest speakers and a special treat for returning the walking list.

Role Playing Exercise

Each table had a captain to lead the members at their table in role playing exercises for doorbelling. Here are the highlights:

"Do Not Solicit" signs - We aren't selling anything so we are not solicitors.

Have fun. Your attitude will color the interaction at the door.

Listen to what people have to say. They want to be heard. Mirror their mood and temperament.

If you have a dissenter, listen, then explain how endorsements happen.

Identify yourself immediately as a neighbor and where you live.

Tell them that you are a volunteer, not a paid doorbeller.

Bring water and stay hydrated.

People will eventually start to recognize you. Be sure to include your contact information in the materials so that people have a way of connecting with you afterward.

Any information that you garner from walking your precinct is helpful in updating the list. Be sure to turn your list back in so these updates can be made by the state party.

Campaign Contributions

There was a lengthy discussion as to how to spend the \$3,500 budgeted to contribute to campaigns this election season. A subcommittee was appointed at the last board meeting to make recommendations for campaign contributions based on how closely the campaign's values align with the 34th District Democrats, how dangerous their opposition is to our values, how viable the campaign is, and how helpful we could be by making a donation.

This is what the committee proposed:

\$1,000 - No on I-1125, the Tim Eyman Roads Initiative

\$1,000 - No on I-1183, the "Costco" Liquor Initiative

\$800 - Approve Families and Education Levy

\$700 - Dean Willard for Port of Seattle

A motion was made and approved to take \$200 from the No on I-1183 and add it to the No on I-1125 campaign, the thinking being that an awful lot of money has gone to the No on I-1183 campaign and our money would have much more an effect on the No on I-1125 campaign. There were several other motions to move money from one campaign to another, but when all was said and done, there was very little change from the original proposal, except for the transfer of funds in these two initiatives, which had broad support.

There was a motion to transfer \$300 to Marty McLaren's campaign, which was approved by a very close vote. But when the whole proposal was voted on, a motion was made to remove the \$300 for her and transfer it back. That motion was approved by a tie vote of 18 - 18.

A motion was made to contribute \$100 to Occupy Seattle, which was then raised to \$200. There was much discussion on how and who would receive the money and whether campaign funds were appropriate. Since we have available funds in the community contributions fund, a motion was made and approved to contribute \$200 to Occupy Seattle out of the community contributions fund.

This is the final slate of contributions:

No on I-1125 - \$1,200

No on I-1183 - \$800

Families and Education Levy \$800

Dean Willard for Port Commissioner - \$700

Occupy Seattle \$200 from Community Contributions fund.

After good of the order, the meeting adjourned at 9:25.
