Please take a few moments in the next month to log comments with the Commission. One criteria of the Commission is to ensure that communities with common interests are not divided. Vashon and Maury have a tremendous amount in common with the rest of the 7th CD and must stay put. Another is that they not discriminate against an incumbent. Slade Gorton's effort to draw the 34th boundary around Representative Fitzgibbon's home is blatant gerrymandering to unnecessarily displace a great Democratic Representative. 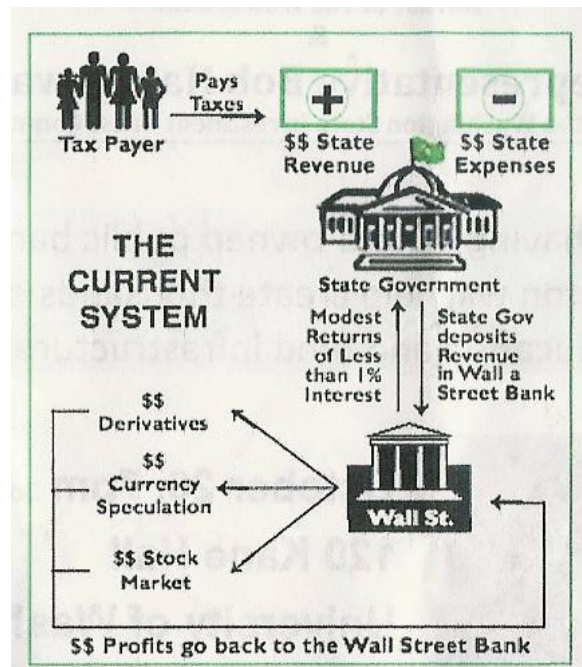
## Forum on a Public Bank for the State of Washington

Nearly half the cost of building schools is simply interest paid to megabanks and bond holders. A Public State Bank could issue school districts very low interest construction loans - saving local taxpayers billions of dollars in property taxes every year.

Our current system provides profits to big banks, which give almost no small business loans. Instead of banking on Wall Street, we need to bank on Main Street.

North Dakota has had a public bank for years and is the only state in the country not suffering a budget deficit - it has a \$1 billion surplus this year.

## In Case You Missed Our Last Meeting. . .

The preliminary redistricting maps had just come out the day before the meeting, so there wasn't that much time to go over them, but a few changes were noted. All will have an impact on our current boundaries, most notably in Burien. Some have added territory in Burien; some have eliminated territory. Chair Tim Nuse thanked Carol Frillman and Justin Anderson, Fundraising Co-chairs for the best Garden Party yet. Carol thanked a large number of people including subcommittee chairs Mike Heavey, Chris Porter, Marcee Stone, Ed Dupras, Heather Woodruff and Kathy Minsch.

### Program

#### \$60 Vehicle License Fee

Councilmember Tom Rasmussen spoke first, reminding us that several years ago, we endorsed Streets for All, a grassroots effort to improve transit and transportation. There was no specified plan, but a goal of pedestrian safety, transit and infrastructure. The City Council heard the request and with a citizens advisory committee put together a package funded by a ten year vehicle license fee of \$60. Half the money is targeted for transit improvements, signal prioritization, an electric trolley system and doubling the amount of money for sidewalk repairs. Of the rest of the money 30% would be for maintenance and repair to streets, and 20% for bicycle improvements.

David Miller believes that the plan is a bad plan and that is a regressive tax. Kim Becklund agreed that it is regressive and said that they are looking at a fix to mitigate the problem, perhaps with a lower fee. But David Miller points out that if the fee is lowered, then we aren't getting the revenue that we budgeted for, and that's a problem.

The plan calls for \$100 million on transit, but no new bus hours or routes. The plan follows Metro's recommendation emphasizing running time, including signal synchronization. Tom Rasmussen emphasized that what people tell him is they want for the buses to run on time.

David Miller points out that \$18 million is budgeted for studies for streetcars, but Tom Rasmussen explained that \$3 million was for studies, but some money would be used for extending the streetcar from Broadway to John and Aloha.

There is funding for only nine sidewalks a year, but there is funding for 1,240 bicycle parking spots and 100 miles of bike signage. Miller, a member of the Cascade Bicycle Club, mentioned the bike accident on beach drive caused by a pothole. He thinks that money would be better spent on fixing the potholes, and this would benefit bikes as well as cars and pedestrians.

His recommendation is to vote this proposition down and come back with a better plan.

### Endorsements

After the program, we moved on to endorsements. For a full list of candidates endorsed in the June and September meetings, see pages 7.

A block vote that included Dean Willard for Port Commissioner Position 5, No on I-1125, and Sili Savusa for Highline School District Director District 1, and No on I-1183, Privatizing Liquor Sales was recommended. Barbara Schaad-Lamphere made a motion to remove I-1183 from the Block Vote.

The block vote, without No on I-1183, passed by acclamation

**Seattle School Board Position 1** - Peter Maier and Sharon Peaslee were nominated for endorsement. **Sharon Peaslee** was endorsed.

**I-1163**, Background checks and training for Long Term Health Care Workers was **endorsed** with 76% of the vote.

**Seattle School Board, Position 2** - Sherry Carr and Kate Martin were nominated for endorsement. Neither candidate received 60%, so we went to a second ballot for dual endorsement or no endorsement. Neither received the required 60%, so **No Position** was taken on this race.

**Seattle Proposition 1 - Streets for All \$60 Car Tab** - Neither position received the required 60%, so **No Position** taken on this race.

**Seattle School Board Position 3** - Harrium Martin-Morris and Michelle Buetow were nominated for endorsement. **Michelle Buetow** was nominated with 64% of the vote.

Next was **I-1183**, the initiative to privatize liquor sales. Although it was removed from the block vote, no one spoke in support, and seeing no opposition, a **NO** vote was endorsed by voice vote.

The last endorsement was for **Burien City Council, Position 6**. Debi Wagner and Jerry Robison were nominated for endorsement. **Debi Wagner** was endorsed with 73% of the vote.

### Financial Report

Walter Sive, Finance Committee Chair, gave us a short update on our finances. Through the end of August, we have budgeted to have \$11,697 and we actually have \$19,500. Taking into account recurring expenses and our end of the year budget target of \$11,700, we have about \$3,500 to spend in this year's fall election cycle.

### PCO Appointment

Kimber Starr was appointed PCO in SEA 34-1438.

In **New Business**, Ann Martin brought forth a motion regarding a newspaper that appeared to be a campaign piece for Diana Toledo that was paid for with the Department of Neighborhoods Small Sparks Fund. The motion was approved unanimously. Much scrambling around to get a copy of that newspaper ensued. The motion is on the next page with a sampling of some of the articles in the newspaper. After Good of the Order the meeting adjourned to the Elliott Bay Brewery.

# Is It a Newspaper or a Campaign Piece for Diana Toledo?

## A Motion Asking for an Investigation

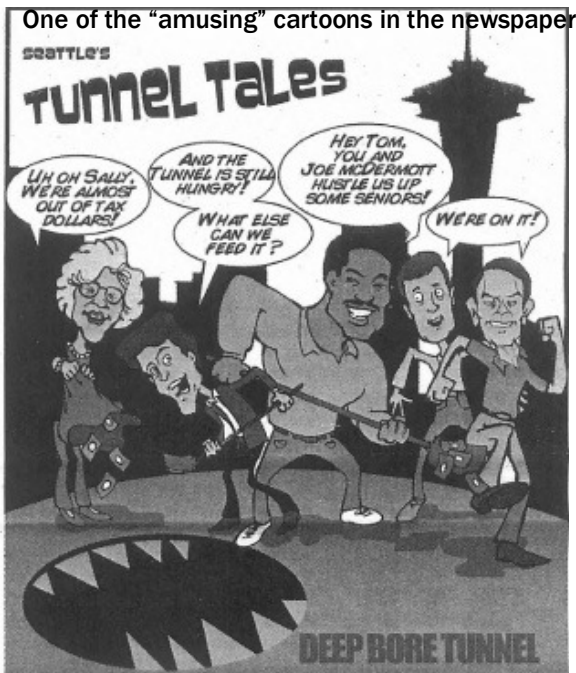
A group of young people came to Ann Martin's house offering her a free newspaper. She is probably one of few people who actually read the paper, and much to her surprise, what she was reading appeared to be a campaign piece for Diana Toledo. Her brother and campaign manager is Director of the organization that put out the so-called newspaper. At our last meeting Ann Martin made a motion to do the following:

The 34th District Democratic Organization requests investigations by:

1) The Washington State Public Disclosure Commission (PDC) of the possible failure to report a campaign contribution to the Diana Toledo campaign and other possible violations of PDC reporting requirements; and

2) The city of Seattle of the possible misuse of a Department of Neighborhoods Small Sparks Fund \$1,000 grant by Unified Outreach, whose Director, David Toledo, also manages the campaign of Diana Toledo, in publishing the Youth Arts Compendium, Vol. 1, No. 2011 newspaper, a piece of campaign literature supporting one candidate, Diana Toledo, and attempting to discredit another, Joe McDermott, in the King County Council District 8 race.

3) Letters outlining the organization's concerns and the factual basis for these concerns shall be sent by the Organization chair to both the PDC and the City of Seattle (Mayor, appropriate City Council members, and the Department of Neighborhoods).

## A Sampling of the Free Newspaper

On the front page, one writer seems to have a peculiar dislike of the "residents of the primarily Caucasian paradise known as Vashon Island. . . who did not want a gravel mine operating on their little slice of heaven. There seemed to be no time to waste as our politicians leapt into action, shutting down the mining company, and finding the funding necessary to purchase the intended land and build a park on the very spot which was in question." Wasted no time? It was thirteen years of hard work, and the "mining company" is a large conglomerate that wasn't exactly shut down. The writer compares this to neglect of the South Park Bridge, which did get funding, thanks to a lot of hard work on the part of those who represent them.

Page 3 is a photo album, but the whole of page 4 and half of page 5 is devoted to "Diana Toledo's innovative plan to bring Arts back to Public Schools," explaining Toledo's plan to dissolve the Office of Arts and Cultural Affairs and the "elitist 4Culture agencies" and put that money into arts programs in the public schools, a plan that is not only illegal, but her brother benefited from this "elitism."

On to page 5, where the headline is "Senior Outrage! Candidate 'misled us' says senior community." They claim that some seniors were confused and voted for Joe McDermott thinking he was Jim McDermott's son. According to the author, this is the greatest identity hoax since Cassie Chadwick pretended to be Andrew Carnegie's daughter. They say in all fairness, Joe McDermott has stated public several times that he is not related to the Congressman, but it sure doesn't hurt to have a familiar name. But there is a picture of Jim McDermott with the caption *VICTIM*. Victim of what, who knows.

There is a story of about the deep bore tunnel that doesn't appear to blame Joe McDermott, but there is a list, in the column on the left, of candidates for and against. There's also a cute little cartoon above the list. If it's too fuzzy to read, here's what it's about: One Council member, Jean Godden maybe, says we're almost out of dollars, Sally Clark says the tunnel is still hungry. Someone, Bruce Harrell maybe, yells "Hey Tom, you and Joe McDermott hustle up some seniors! They answer "We're on it!" A story about the "Scandal at the 34th District Democrats Mid-Summer Classic is a tongue-in-cheek article about our softball game. Why that was big news is anybody's guess, but they did make sure that we knew that David Toledo took Joe McDermott's place when Joe very sensibly left the game after the rainstorm.

The rest of the paper is about arts groups, including the hip hop dance group Vicious Puppies. Those of you who attended the June Candidates Forum at Hiawatha might remember them, that amazing group of break dancers wearing bright yellow Diana Toledo T-shirts.

The last page shows both Joe McDermott and Diana Toledo's page in the Primary Election pamphlet., with the headline "Candidates split the 11th District Democrats Endorsement." The miss the part where Joe was endorsed by acclamation and Diana won endorsement by a couple of votes. She didn't even ask for our endorsement knowing that she wasn't going to get it.

## Report from the Washington State Democrats

There was a lot to discuss at this meeting: redistricting, PCO elections, and a significant number of resolutions.

The Executive Board voted to authorize Dwight Pelz to enter into negotiations with the legislature regarding PCO elections, which may include online voting. This decision was made in response to a recent court ruling that Washington State PCO elections under the Top Two primary are unconstitutional because anyone could vote for party officials. One sticking point at the meeting concerned online voting. In addition to the argument that online voting is not secure, other arguments included cost, and the fact that the King Conservation District election, which was online, had very low turnout. Dwight Pelz argued that the legislature might eliminate PCO elections entirely and we need to keep our options open. In addition, county auditors have been clamoring to completely eliminate precincts.

The motion was amended to read "The WSDCC authorizes the State Party Chair to enter into negotiations with the legislature regarding PCO elections. The Chair would take any terms of these negotiations to the Executive Board and the Executive Board would have to approve the results of the negotiations."

Next on the agenda was a discussion of redistricting and reorganization. A motion was made that "the State Central Committee directs legislative district organizations to begin meeting within their new geographic boundaries from the 2010 federal census within 30 days of adoption by the legislature."

An amendment was proposed that would have changed the timeline to after the district caucuses, and to use their first meeting to conduct an election of new officers if necessary.

An argument against the proposed amendment was consistency with Congressional District boundaries. Dwight Pelz feels that the Charter does not allow the WSDCC to force the reorganization of local parties, or the reelection of State Committee Members. Alec Stephens spoke against the motion: LDs need to be ready to handle the election season. Candidates will want to begin working with the new organizations as soon as possible.

Another consideration was how to handle it if the final redistricting plan is delayed, but Dwight Pelz thought the body would be able to address that at the January meeting if it is a problem. The original motion, amended to read "boundaries from the 2012 redistricting" in place of "2010 federal census passed easily."
