Every year, King County Democrats sponsors a day in Olympia for all districts in King County. Later, during lunch, we heard from any legislator in King County who was able to get away from meetings. This is a great way to get the inside scoop on what's happening in Olympia this important year. Governor Gregoire has also met with us, but only if she is able. Last year, it was a busy day when we were there, to put it mildly, but instead of meeting with the Governor, we had a surprise visit from Senator Patty Murray, who had come from Washington to discuss the budget. After lunch, we usually meet with our three legislators.

In the afternoon you are free to go home, take a tour of the capitol, head to Lacey for the rest of the Grass Roots Forum, and follow it up with the Annual Crab Feed. You may sign up on line at kcdems.org (There is a \$20 charge for lunch and materials) and be sure to get in touch with Les Treall, our LAC Chair for carpool information and to discuss where to meet.

Grass Roots Forum and Crab Feed

The Grass Roots Forum will be held at St. Martin's University in Lacey from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The cost is \$15 and includes lunch. The sessions include Campaign Messaging, How to Become a Delegate, and Vote Builder Training. Check wa-democrats.org/crab for the full schedule.

The Crab Feed is scheduled to begin at 5:00 p.m., but usually you have no trouble getting in immediately after the Forum. Tickets are \$50. Bills Supported by our Legislators

HB 1877 Regarding Retail Checkout Bags Sponsored by Joe Fitzgibbon and Marko Lilas

This bill has been a big story in *The Stranger*, who loves Joe. It would ban all plastic bags except compostable plastic bags and those used for vegetables, meat, etc. and would require a \$.05 charge for paper. It is easy to avoid these charges by bringing your own bag.

HB 2330: Affordable abortions for all Sponsored by Eileen Cody

This bill would require all health-insurance policies sold in Washington State that offer maternity coverage to also cover abortions. It has never made much sense that insurance companies would be required to pay for childbirth, which is far more expensive, but not for an abortion. Other people's moral compasses should not come into play in one's own health care.

SB 5291: Regarding Signature Gatherers

This bill would create transparency in the initiative process. It would raise the fee from \$5 to \$450 to \$500, would require signature gatherers to actually sign the back of the initiative, businesses using signature gatherers must register with the Secretary of State; the petition must show the full text of the measure. And Tim Eyman hates this bill.

Resolution for Support of Charter Schools in Washington State

The following resolution was submitted by Walter Sive and Bill Schrier for consideration at our February meeting:

Whereas, the platform of the National Democratic Party supports public charter schools; and

Whereas, the highest ranking elected Democrat in the land, President Barack Obama, supports public charter schools; and

Whereas, “the National Education Association (NEA) believes that charter schools and other non traditional public school options have the potential to facilitate education reforms and develop new and creative teaching methods that can be replicated in traditional public schools for the benefit of all children. Whether charter schools will fulfill this potential depends on how charter schools are designed and implemented, including oversight and assistance provided by charter authorizers”; and

Whereas, the largest teachers union in the country, the American Federation of Teachers (AFT), also supports public charter schools; and

Whereas, public charter schools are now a mainstream option in 41 states, the District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico; and

Whereas, more than 20 urban school districts around the country now partner with public charter schools to create system-wide improvements; and

Whereas, public charter schools are serving a more diverse group of students than traditional public schools; and

Whereas, high quality public charter schools are successfully closing achievement gaps; and

Whereas, parents want public charter schools, as evidenced by waiting lists that include 420,000 students; and

Whereas, high quality public charter schools give underserved parents a choice and voice in their children’s education; and

Whereas, high quality public charter schools can act as laboratories of reform, identifying successful practices that can be replicated by traditional public schools; and

Whereas, high quality public charter schools offer teachers autonomy not typically found in traditional public schools; and

Whereas, Washington State ranks 37th in the nation in high school graduation rates; and

Whereas, Washington State has entrenched income and racial achievement gaps; and

Whereas, if Washington State continues on its current path, it will take 105 years to close the achievement gap; and

Whereas, low income and minority parents should have access to great schools for their children; and

Whereas, only 11% of African American and Hispanic

students in South Seattle and South King County schools are on track to get a certificate with labor market value, or a career credential, or a college degree; and

Whereas, KIPP, one of several high performing public charter school networks, serves 32,000 students (85% are from low income families, 95% are African American or Hispanic), 95% of whom have graduated from high school; and

Whereas, a high quality public education system is the cornerstone of a prosperous, free and just society; and

Whereas, children trapped in low performing schools are particularly vulnerable; and

Whereas, fighting for the most vulnerable is supposed to be what the Democratic Party stands for; and

Whereas, the Washington State Democrats and King County Democrat’s defense of an educational status quo that poorly serves low income and minority kids is not in the best interests of our children or their families; and

Whereas, Washington State Democrats intransigence on public charter schools will prove to be a political liability;

Therefore be it resolved, that we 34th District Democrats strongly advocate for the passage of a public charter school law in Washington State that provides opportunities for our educationally disadvantaged students.

Be it further resolved that Washington State’s public charter school law takes advantage of 20 years of lessons learned in other states and focuses on strong accountability for authorizers and schools.

Be it finally resolved that we 34th District Democrats urge our legislators to work to support a public charter school law for Washington State that focuses on giving educationally disadvantaged students access to high quality public charter schools. Copies of this resolution shall be sent to our 34th District legislators, Governor Gregoire, and Superintendent of Public Education Randy Dorn.

Resolution for Continued Prohibition of Charter Schools in Washington State

Whereas the platforms of the King County Democrats and the Washington State Democrats specifically oppose publicly funded charter schools and vouchers; and

Whereas the voters of Washington State have defeated charter measures three times; and

Whereas peer-reviewed research shows that 83% of charter schools perform no better, and often worse, than public schools; and

Whereas most charter schools serve only a select group of students; and

Whereas children with severe disabilities are rarely allowed access to charter schools, students who do not meet school performance goals are “counseled out” of charter schools; and charter school populations are more segregated and less diverse than public schools; and

Whereas students are required to compete for positions in charter schools, rather than the open enrollment of public schools;

Whereas the financial instability of charter schools causes many of them to fail and close—sometimes in mid-year—creating greater instability in a community; and

Whereas Washington State is experiencing a prolonged fiscal and budgetary crisis, while charter school legislation would require substantial additional revenue; and

Whereas charter schools receive public funds but receive limited local or state oversight; and

Whereas some charter schools shift public moneys to private for-profit firms; and

Whereas charter schools often hire less qualified and inexperienced teachers to control their costs; and

Whereas charter school teachers are required to work longer hours and take on additional responsibilities with the same or less pay than their counterparts in public schools;

Therefore be it resolved, that we Democrats strongly advocate for continued prohibition of charter schools in Washington State, and

Be it further resolved that we as Democrats 1) reject the emphasis on charter schools as the vanguard approach for the education of children, instead of focusing attention, funding, and policy advocacy on improving existing public schools and 2) will work through local, state and federal legislative processes to ensure that all public schools are provided the necessary funding and support necessary to educate all students; and

Be it finally resolved that we Democrats urge our legislators to oppose charter schools and to work to support and to adequately fund public schools to educate all children to their highest potential.

Copies of this resolution shall be sent to all King County legislators, Governor Gregoire, and Superintendent of Public Education Randy Dorn.



A Resolution Supporting Funding of I-1163

This resolution is presented by Kimber Starr

Whereas the voters of Washington State overwhelmingly passed I-1163 for the second time in three years, stating loud and clear that better training for home care workers is a priority;

Whereas I-1163 passed overwhelmingly in all of Washington's 39 counties, and with more than 65 percent of the vote overall;

Whereas in 2008, I-1029 passed with more than 72 percent of the vote, as more than three million Washingtonians supported these common sense protections for seniors and people with disabilities;

Whereas public safety officials have regularly cited a lack of training as a cause of abuse and neglect in adult family and boarding homes, citations of which increased 15 percent from 2008-2010, after voters first called for these reforms;

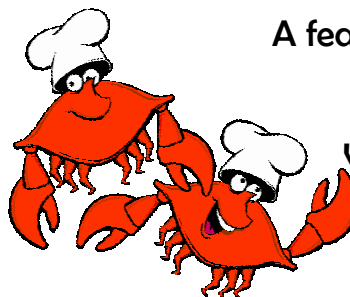
Whereas it is time the state legislature creates a balanced approach toward solving the budget crisis facing Washington – no longer focusing solely on cuts, but creating a comprehensive revenue package. We can no longer attempt to balance our budget on the backs of our most vulnerable, our seniors and people with disabilities;

Chair's Report

2012 is going to be a big year. Tim Nuse made a call to arms to get our friends, family and neighbors engaged in re-electing President Obama, Senator Cantwell, and Representative Jim McDermott, and electing Jay Inslee governor.

Anyone who reads the West Seattle Blog knows that the home of animal advocate Teri Ensley, director

of Furry Faces Foundation, F³, was damaged considerably due to a house fire. What many may not know is that Teri is a member of the 34th District Democrats. Teri has given much to the community with her foundation, which helps those with few resources to feed and care for their cats, and to help with spaying and neutering. Her house was used for storing supplies for Furry Faces, and much of it was lost. It's time to give back. A hat was passed around and we collected over \$100. Sabra Schneider recognized Tamsen Spengler for bringing two new people to our meeting: Sopha Danh of the Cambodian Cultural Alliance of Washington, and Pharin Thuang.

Timothy Anderson, State Director of Coordinated Campaign

Before his presentation, Timothy commented that of all the legislative districts around the state where he has spoken, the 34th District has, by far, the largest turnout at its meetings.

Elections are not just about winning elections, but are about community and contributing something lasting for the cause.

The goals of the coordinated campaign are simple: win elections for Democrats by turning out people who vote for Democratic candidates. Timothy wants this goal to be compatible with the goals of local organizations such as our 34th District. The campaign is big on training in order for people to learn how to lead a canvass or phone bank, recruit volunteers, enter data, and a whole host of other activities. The plan for the year is still taking shape, but the coordinated campaign will be heavily involved in the Obama, Cantwell and Inslee campaigns. April will be a key kickoff with activity heating up in June, so stay tuned.

Brian Bennett, Mayor of Burien

Brian Bennett, the new Mayor of Burien, spoke about the threatened closure of King County libraries in Boulevard Park and in White Center and the building of one facility in another location. These neighborhoods would lose a valuable resource to those in these communities, especially the youth. The Library Board needs to hear from people that closing these libraries would have a detrimental effect on their

neighborhoods. Brian had only a short time to talk and promised to come back and talk about Burien's priorities.

Josh Friedes, Equal Rights Washington

Josh Friedes, Director of Marriage for ERW, is convinced that this is the year that the bill for marriage equality will pass the legislature. The votes are there in the House and they are working to get the votes in the Senate, and in the last couple of days, two Republican Senators have signed on. Governor Gregoire is on board and has said she will sign the bill when it passes. Those of us in progressive districts need to understand how hard a lift this will be across the state where marriage equality is not understood. but, on the other side, younger voters are excited about it as an important civil rights issue. We will win when we tell our personal stories about why marriage matters, whether we are gay, lesbian or straight. He invited all of us to support marriage equality, a Washington value, on Marriage Equality Day, February 16. Washington United for Marriage is the coalition working on this bill. For updates, be sure to like it on Facebook. If you can volunteer to help, phone banks are working Monday through Thursday and on the weekends and they can always use more help.

Redistricting Review

Maps of the new Congressional Districts and the new 34th Legislative District were presented. The whole of the 34th District is now in the 7th Congressional District. In the old 7th, most of the southern half of Burien was in the 9th. Most of Seattle is still in the 7th, which now extends north to Edmonds, but a small part of the eastern part of Seattle is now in the 9th, the new majority minority district. The 1st District now extends to the Canadian Border.

If you are now in the 34th District, you are still in the 34th District. No changes were made north of SW 102nd in White Center or south of SW 160th in Burien. Our boundary will extend to SR 599 between these two streets. Presently it runs mostly along 4th Ave SW with jogs west to 6th and 8th.

New Business

The resolution in support of I-502, the initiative that would legalize but regulate and tax marijuana, passed easily.

Les Treall announced that we need a new coordinator to organize our volunteers at the White Center Food Bank. The 34th District Democrats have committed to provide volunteers on the fourth Wednesday of each month for the last six or seven years. By providing volunteers on this day on an ongoing basis, the Food Bank has been able to keep the doors open for their clients. A big thank you to Beth Grieser who has faithfully served in this position for at least six years.

Good of the Order

Marvin Rosete, Vice Chair of the 11th District Democrats and bringer of delicious foods to our meetings, informed us that three members of the 11th District Democrats Executive Board are now in the 34th District. One of these is Chair Martha Koester, and another is George Summers, an old friend of the 34th District Democrats before he was redistricted into the 11th. Welcome back, George. And welcome Marlene Albright who is new to the 34th District.

2012 Caucuses and Convention

In 2008, Washington State broke a national record for it's 248,458 Democrats attending precinct caucuses. In the 34th district we had over 10,000 Democrats attending. This year, we certainly don't expect that many attendees because obviously there isn't any mystery as to who our candidate will be for 2012.

Effect of Redistricting

Democrats will attend the 2012 caucus in their new districts. A few of these precincts are split between two districts. We have three precincts that are partially in the 34th and partially in the 33rd. These are BUR 33-0729,, BUR 33-0515, BUR 33-0281 and BUR 33-1067. The County will establish new boundaries so that the whole of the precinct is in one district, but it is unlikely that this will happen before the precinct caucuses. According to the rules set by the Washington State Democratic Central Committee, the chairs of the 34th and 33rd Districts will meet to decide which district's caucus the Democrats in these precincts will attend this year.

All of our new precincts from 11th District are wholly in the 34th. These precincts are Sylvan, Glasgow, Bernice, BUR 11-0900, BUR 11-0913, BUR 11- 0033, BUR 0824, BUR 0298, BUR 0377. Progressive Women's Network of Washington

On Saturday, January 21, the organization Progressive Majority held a fundraising event designed to launch a new project, the Progressive Women's Network of Washington. The 34th District Democrats were well represented, with Marcee Stone hosting a table consisting of Kari Feeny, Aileen Sison, Sharon Huling, and Layne Bautista.

Progressive Majority's mission is to recruit, train, and elect progressive candidates at the state and local levels. This new project/network aims to build a robust, diverse, and sustainable network of women from all walks of life to identify, mentor, and support progressive women to run for office, particularly women of color, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender, and young women.

The launch event's agenda presented us with several high quality, inspirational speakers. Some were state legislators, including Senate Majority Leader Lisa Brown and State Representative Laurie Jenkins. There were also representatives from such significant organizations as Planned Parenthood Votes Northwest (Elaine Rose), Washington State Nurses Association (Sofia Aragon), and the National Organization of Women (Lonnie Johns-Brown).

The purpose of the Progressive Women's Network is to not only increase the percentage of women in our legislature and other offices, but to affect change by promoting female candidates who will work toward social and economic justice, civil rights, access to healthcare, strong public education, environmental conservation, and reproductive freedom, not just because these are progressive goals, but because they are the right things to pursue in order to guarantee a socially just society and a truly representative democracy.

Kristina Logsdon of Win/Win Network and Ballot Initiative Network spoke of common thinking among women that prevents them from running for office ... thoughts of unworthiness or lack of experience and uncertainties about their readiness. She pointed out the disparity between the percentages of young people and people of color within the eligible voting population and the percentages of corresponding populations within the electorate. We were reminded by Lonnie that, with regard to the state budget, it makes a difference who sits on and/or chairs certain committees and what bills make it to the floor. The things we value and want to promote may not happen unless we work together to get more women into positions that will influence issues that affect women.

Progressive Majority is attempting to raise the needed financial resources to hire a full-time coordinator for this project to move it forward, as well as seeking dedicated resources and people willing to give their time. All in all, it was a great way to spend a Saturday morning. Even with lots of slushy snow left on the ground, attendance at the event was impressive.
