Legislative Action Committee Day in Olympia

The 34th District had a great turnout on LAC Day. Around twenty of our members showed up to learn what's happening in Olympia. It was a day well spent.

Twenty-two legislators spoke with us during lunch, one after another, to tell us what they have done, and what they haven't been able to do, so far this session. Most of the talk, of course, was the budget and loss of funding for favorite programs. My personal favorite quote, and I am sorry I can't remember who said it, is "Not so many people are talking about running the government like a business anymore."

After lunch, we met with our three legislators in their offices. The impact of the budget problems was evident in all our conversations. Eileen Cody is Chair of the Health Care and Wellness Committee, which is especially affected. Eileen is a strong advocate of public health care, and she said, rather poignantly, that she didn't want her tombstone to read that it was because of her that our basic health plan was lost. Tough choices have to be made and it's not pleasant doing it.

The LAC members reported about the bills they were working on. There were two bills on election reform: one good, one not. One would require absentee ballots to be returned to the county auditor by 8:00 the day of the primary or election. This would mean that voters would have to vote by Saturday to be sure that their ballot would be received by Tuesday. The LAC is opposed to this bill.

The second bill, which Joe McDermott sponsors, would use existing databases to automatically register all citizens to vote; would allow same day registration for those voters left off the rolls; allow students to register when they are 16 so that they can automatically vote when they are 18; require citizens to register to vote, or opt out, when they get a drivers license; and require county auditors to automatically update voter registrations based on Post Office address changes. Other bills discussed were the Homeowners' Bill of Rights, Secure Medicine Return, Public Campaign Financing for the State Supreme Court, and reform of the Three Strikes law, among others.

Resolution Opposing Internet Voting SB 5522 and HB 1624

The following resolution was submitted by David Ginsberg for consideration at the March 11 meeting:

WHEREAS, the integrity, transparency and security of elections should always be the highest priorities for election reform;

WHEREAS, the conclusions stated herein are those of the computer security experts hired by the Department of Defense. They were the Security Peer Review Group hired to evaluate the DOD's 2003 Internet voting program (SERVE). These experts were tasked with identifying potential risks to the integrity of an election and how to mitigate those risks. The Internet voting program was intended for overseas and military voters. The project was shut down after experts concluded that Internet voting poses too many risks that cannot be mitigated;

WHEREAS, not only does Internet voting have the same risks as DRE (direct recording electronic) touch screen voting (e.g., insider attacks by programmers, inadequate audit capabilities) but it also has numerous fundamental security problems that leave it vulnerable to cyber attacks (e.g. insider and denial of service attacks, spoofing, automated vote buying, viral attacks, vote flipping, etc), any one of which could be catastrophic. Attacks could come from many sources including political parties, terrorists, hackers, and other countries;

WHEREAS, most of the security problems with Internet voting are generic to any PC and Internet application and *fundamentally* have no effective solutions. The vulnerabilities with Internet voting cannot be fixed by better design of Internet voting software. The vulnerabilities are fundamental to the architecture of the Internet and PCs and their software. They cannot be eliminated for the foreseeable future and likely will never be eliminated without a wholesale redesign and replacement of the hardware and software security systems that are part of or connected to, today's Internet;

WHEREAS, it is not that solutions to the problems of Internet voting have not deployed, it is that the real problem is that no fundamental solution is possible using the current Internet protocols and the current PC hardware and software platforms;

WHEREAS, there should be better support for voting for our military and for citizens living overseas, but we do not do them any favors by providing them with a flagrantly

insecure and in-auditable method of voting. It would be irresponsible to put our democracy at risk by allowing votes to be transmitted over the wide-open and insecure Internet.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the 34th District Democrats oppose Internet voting and HB 1624 and SB 5522.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we call upon Washington State Representatives Sharon Nelson and Eileen Cody and Senator Joe McDermott, and all members of the Washington State Senate and House of Representatives to oppose Internet voting and these two bills.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Chair of the 34th District Democrats will forward this resolution to Sam Reed, to the elected officials of the 34th District Democrats and to all members of the Senate Committee on Government and Elections and the House Committee on Government and Tribal Affairs, and to the Washington State Democratic Party Leaders.

Resolution To Support Renaming The West Seattle Bridge

The following resolution was submitted by Allan Munro for consideration at our March 11 meeting:

Whereas, the bridge across the Duwamish waterway, commonly known as the "West Seattle Bridge," connecting West Seattle directly with SR 99 and with I-5 via Spokane Street, provides significant benefits to Seattle residents;

Whereas Jeanette Williams, while a member of the Seattle City Council, was the primary figure in procuring the funding necessary to build the bridge at a high level, rather than just above the water as its predecessor was configured before being irreparably damaged by a marine collision;

Whereas the bridge's high level eliminates the need to raise and lower the bridge for marine traffic, making it the best solution for drivers and others;

Whereas no other person was as instrumental in seeing the high-level solution implemented; and

Whereas Mrs. Williams is now deceased, thereby meeting a criterion set forth by city ordinance;

Therefore, be it resolved that the West Seattle Bridge should be renamed the "Jeanette Williams Bridge" for now and in perpetuity; and

Be it further resolved that the 34th District Democrats petition the City Council and the Mayor of Seattle to initiate and pass the necessary ordinances to accomplish the renaming of the bridge.



KCDCC Report

The highlight of the meeting: Welcome to Dow Constantine, Chair of King County Council and recently announced candidate for King County Executive. We gave Dow a warm 34th welcome with posters, buttons and cheers. He gave a rousing speech describing his long track record with the Democrats.

Endorsement of Candidates: Three candidates for public office spoke and were endorsed: Lloyd Hara, Rob Holland and Cindy Rye. Lloyd Hara is running for reelection to Seattle Port Commission, Position 3.

Rob Holland is running for Position 4. He is third generation shipyard/dock worker and has also served as community organizer and 37th District Chair. He calls for putting infrastructure finances into place, creating green jobs and improving accountability.

Cindy Ryu, the first and only Korean-American mayor in the country, is running for reelection to the Shoreline City Council/Mayor.

Status of the Organization: Suzie Sheary congratulated everyone for working effectively together to elect Sherill Huff. King County now has 1,233 PCOs, 300 ahead of last year, and our dues-paying membership is also up. Young Democrats announced they are organizing their first Idaho chapter.

The state party has set up a committee with Sharon Mast as chair to work on reviewing and improving the caucus and convention cycle.

In Case You Missed Our Meeting of February 11. . .

The meeting was called to order at 7:11, a little late because of microphone problems.

Chair Report

Chair Tim Nuse explained that Nick Licata would not be at the meeting because the topic he was to speak about, the Mercer Mess, was settled.

Greg Doss, Legislative Action Chair, passed out a signup sheet for his committee and for Legislative Action Day in Olympia on Presidents Day.

A strategic summit of committee chairs is being held on February 22. The 34th District Democrats has received an anonymous donation to send two people to Camp Wellstone, April 24-26. If you are interested, information is on the website.

First Vice Chair Report

First Vice Chair Kim Becklund spoke about the Delridge Neighborhood Development Association and introduced Suzanne Nevan of the DNDA.

Program

Sally Clark, Chair of the Planning, Land Use, and Neighborhoods Committee, spoke about the multifamily code and how to make it sustainable for West Seattle communities.

When asked about the vote against the proposed deal with Burien that would have split up the North Highline area, she answered that Seattle was at a disadvantage without the money from sales tax revenue. As of now, Seattle is looking at a southern boundary of Roxbury for annexation.

When asked if Seattle would annex the South Park area, She jokingly answered that we could not accept this lovely gift in its present condition. After the laughter died down she explained that the issue of who's paying for the bridge needed to be resolved before anything happens.

Bruce Harrell, Chair of the Energy and Technology Committee, spoke about the issue of \$2 billion worth of capital improvement plans, but revenues of only \$1 million. He continues to strive to keep rates low without sacrificing reliability.

As for the technology aspect of this committee, he relies on our very own Bill Schrier. E-mails and lobbyists currently count for only a tiny fraction of opinion, yet they are heard in much greater proportion. He wants to give every a citizen a password protected account so City Council members can get direct feedback from citizens.

State Senator Joe McDermott interrupted his schedule to give us a summary of what has been happening in the State Legislature so far. With a budget crisis that could get even worse, any bill that costs money is in trouble. It's

simple: no money, no bills. The gap could expand to \$7 billion. He warned that "we will no longer be able to talk about a 'no new taxes' budget."

Joe is sponsoring a bill that would give same sex couples the same State rights as married couples. Married couples would still have 1,100 additional rights and responsibilities under federal laws.

Unemployment claims in December were almost double month to month over the course of a year and the phones for unemployment are jammed. The Senate will look at an Unemployment Bill that would increase the benefit by \$45 a week.

The General Assistance Unemployable and the GUX for disabled are programs that are in peril. Funding for the GUX has ended and legislators are trying to find funding for GAU, but it will be limited.

The Education Funding Task Force is redefining "basic education" and has sent legislation to the floor with this redefinition. This definition is important because it determines funding. There is one lawsuit pending and two competing bills on funding. He is concerned that nothing will get through this session.

And if all this weren't enough, Joe was booed in the Tri-Cities at a meeting of election workers for advocating same day voter registration. So, it doesn't sound like that will happen anytime soon. He thinks an eight-day deadline might be a possibility, but he hasn't given up hope for same day registration. There is also work on legislation to encourage states in the Pacific Northwest to require that their Electoral College members vote for whoever wins the popular vote in the national election.

David Ginsberg is concerned about SB 5522 which sets up a pilot project for internet voting for overseas military personnel. Joe explained that there is a real need to have an option that allows overseas military personnel to get their votes back in time to be counted. There is a national Program that started fours ago but was pulled for security. We are still looking into it as a possibility here in Washington.

A question was asked about restricting campaigns to 45 days, but Joe explained that this would infringe on the freedom of speech. He also feels that voter participation will increase due to the new mail in ballots.

When asked about raising taxes, Joe explains that new taxes may have to be put on the ballot.

PCO Appointments: Annie Phillips will replace Joe Fitzgibbons, who moved out of his precinct, in BUR 34-0344; and Rebecca Wells will be Acting PCO in White Center, where she was PCO before the boundaries changed.

After Good of the Order, the meeting adjourned at 9:00.

Finally, I want you to know what a tremendous job your new Executive Board is doing.
