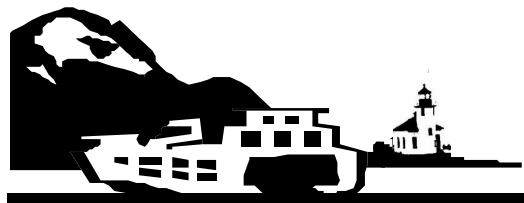

Lots of Opportunities Available with the KCDCC

The newly reorganized King County Democratic Central Committee (KCDCC) held its first meeting of the year on Tuesday, January 25, 2005. The first order of business was to suspend the rules and give an early endorsement to Ron Sims for his re-election as King County Executive. In separate business, a coalition of progressive religious leaders is working for civil rights and equality especially related to gay rights. A rally will be held in Olympia on February 14. ACTION: Join the rally; call local churches and enlist religious leaders to join this effort.

On February 26th a forum/breakfast will be held at the Renton Carpenters Hall with a presentation by King County Councilmember Julia Patterson, who recently returned from Africa and will report on her experiences related to AIDS efforts there. Profits will be donated to the AIDS Alliance in Seattle. ACTION: Attend!

A banquet to honor volunteers will be held March 18 at 6 p.m. in Seattle. Cost is \$70. ACTION: Attend!

The annual budget was approved. It is projected that there will be \$80,000 in revenue and \$75,000 in expenses, leaving a reserve of \$5,000 at the end of the year. ACTION: Pay your dues and authorize the District to contribute \$600.

The KCDCC bylaws were amended. No action necessary except as described below under committees.

The communication vice chair, Rob Dolin, is focusing on expanding media contacts, community retention, i.e., keeping our supporters by creating an expanded activist list, and improving the KCDCC website (kcdems.org) and email.

The community outreach vice chair, Marie Yamamoto, is creating a calendar of legislative district and community events that will help us avoid conflicts among events. She also is working on a cookbook (asking for contributions). Support for a new Hispanic MBA scholarship from the KCDCC was requested. Robert Porterfield, finance chair, and Justin Simmons, treasurer, asked for volunteers to work on the finance committee.

Chelsea Waliser, Adam Smith's new political director, announced that Representative Smith is leading other congress members to oppose Bush's proposals to privatize social security. Later a resolution from Maurice Regnier of the 34th District Democrats was amended and passed to urge the Washington State legislature and our congressional delegation to oppose the privatizing of social security. Early, strong and resolute opposition will be effective, it was argued, in stopping this effort in its tracks.

Noel Frame asked people to listen to talk radio and call in to counter the false statements being made about the legitimacy of the vote for governor. In a related request

Gurine Nordby asked that people who participated in the machine and hand recount as counters or observers write down their experiences. They will be collected into a documentation of this historic event. ACTION: Get writing!


Several committees are looking for volunteers including the candidate recruitment committee (Dick Gidner, chair) and the endorsement committee (Linnea Peterson, chair). Also, PCOs are charged with the appointment of poll workers from their precinct. The importance of these positions has become increasingly clear with the last few votes. We need good, clear-headed, organized individuals to work to make sure polling place is run fairly and accurately. ACTION: Appoint or volunteer!

Resolutions on the following topics were passed by the body: establishing a regional field office of the Democratic Party in eastern Washington; endorsing Howard Dean for chairperson of the Democratic National Committee; and asking the legislature to address through legislative action a 2002 education study that showed a significant gap in WASL scores between low income, minority, disabled and ESL children and the general population.

Good of the order items were announced and we passed a resolution against the privatization of Social Security. Look at the website for details on these and other issues.

Legislative Action Day At the State Legislature

This year the 34th District Democrats will be joining the other 15 legislative district Democratic Party organizations in King County for one large King County Democrats LEGISLATIVE ACTION DAY at the Washington State Legislature in Olympia on President's Holiday. Monday, February 21st. We hope to have a big group from the 34th District. This is the same day as the State Democratic Party sponsored PCO training and annual Crab Feed.

For those 34th members who are not planning to attend the PCO training, we plan to attend Legislative hearings in the morning and ALL meet together for a brown-bag lunch at noon in the John L. O'Brien House Office Building Hearing Room A. Our 34th District Legislators are scheduled to meet with us at the noon hour. FYI, our members have important positions this year and we can expect to hear the progress of important environmental, energy, health and election reform legislation they are sponsoring. Sen, Erik Poulsen is Chair of the Senate Water, Energy and Environment Committee, Rep. Eileen Cody is Chair of the House Health Care Committee and Rep. Joe McDermott is a member of the House Appropriations and State Government Committees. Eileen and Joe have just sent out their first bi-weekly e-newsletter updates on Legislative activity. Every legislative district in King County is contacting their legislative representative asking them to come by and visit with us.

For those of you who can stay, there are afternoon hearings to attend, possibly a tour of the newly renovated Legislative buildings and Supreme Court, and the State Party Crab Feed nearby by in Lacey to drop by on the way home. A list of scheduled hearings will be provided to everyone who meets to carpool the morning of 2/21. A sign up list will be circulated during our February meeting. The Legislative Action Committee members hope you will be able to join us for our annual trip to the Legislature. Discussion of Social Security Reform led by Congressman Jim McDermott

Key Points

- Social Security is not going broke.
- Social Security has a surplus.
- Conservatives have spent the surplus and drained the National Treasury
- Social Security will be safe until at least 2048 – 2055.
- Investing in the stock market as an alternative will be risky.
- Social Security was designed to provide a modest safety net—not to make people rich.
- Social Security also provides a much needed death and injury benefit.
- Social Security can easily be fixed by raising the cap to keep pace with inflation.
- Bush plan will cost an addition trillion \$ of debt.

Things you can do:

- Write your congressional representatives and let them know that SS is non-negotiable.
- Education is key—let young adults know that if we do nothing—there will be at least 75% of benefits available for many years into the future.
