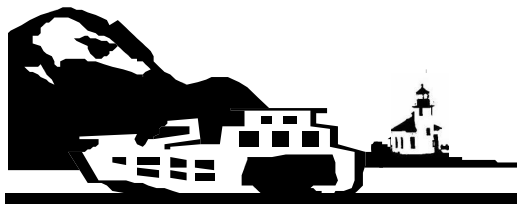

The Power of Working Together to Build Change

This month's meeting is the last one for the 2003-2004 term of the 34th District Democrat Legislative District organization. Yes, nearly two years have passed since this Board was elected in January 2003. It has been an exciting time of unparalleled growth, challenge and change for this organization – particularly this past year with the unprecedented turnout for both the precinct and legislative district caucuses.

It was inspiring for all on the Board to know so many in our District were angry enough at the disastrous policies of this Bush Administration to show up for the first time ever and participate in our grassroots process. As chaotic as it was, we managed to still get through it and come out a stronger, more vital organization. In fact, over the past 2 years we more than doubled our membership from 230 to 510 members.

Our average meeting attendance rose from about 35 to nearly 100. Many new members became active, including leading our committees as well as participating on the Board. Due to redistricting we merged with part of the 11th District, thus increasing our geographic span and diversity of precincts, and bringing us State Representative Eileen Cody, two active Board members, and many new members. We've also had great participation by Vashon. Our newsletter mailing list more than doubled this year. We've had a busy two election years of candidate forums and endorsements, particularly this high stakes Presidential year with all the state races as well.

Financially we are now among the top Districts – thanks to such an awesome turnout at all the caucuses as well as membership dues, extra contributions from our higher level members, and two successful Garden Party fundraisers, we were able to turn around and contribute nearly \$12,000 towards candidates, ballot measure campaigns, and our Get Out the Vote effort.

This is also the last meeting I will chair. My intention was to serve one term, in the hopes that we would attract a lot of new members and energy. Indeed, that has happened. I have been proud to serve at this very exciting time, and it is so gratifying to see a full room at our

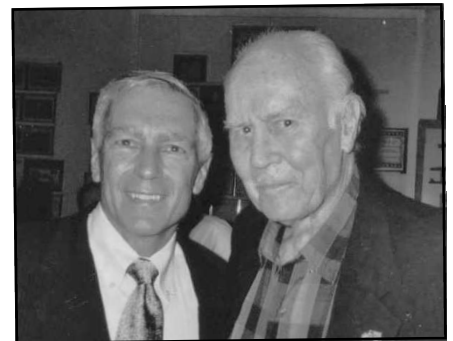

Vote Yes on I-297

Initiative 297 would require contaminated sites to be cleaned up before more waste can be added; stop dumping of nuclear waste in unlined soil ditches; require cleanup of radioactive contamination at dumping grounds and contaminated groundwater; stop the Department of Energy from leaving high-level nuclear waste in tanks at Hanford; and ensure that public, tribal and local government participate in cleanup decisions.

The Department of Energy has plans to import an additional 23,775 truckloads of radioactive waste for dumping at Hanford by trucking this toxic waste through our state. It's time to clean up this toxic nuclear waste before allowing any more dumping.

Vote No on I-872

Don't be fooled. I-872 creates a Louisiana-style primary that would sharply reduce your choices in general elections. Over a third of the statewide and congressional candidates who appeared on the general election ballot in 2000 would have been eliminated in the primary if I-872 had been the law.

If I-872 is passed, third parties, minor parties and even independents will be eliminated from the general election ballot, leaving (in most cases) one Republican and one Democrat. In November 2000, 180,000 voters who voted for third party candidates in the general election would never have had that choice if I-872 had been the law.

Under I-872 many voters will not be able to vote for a candidate that represents their philosophy because the two top vote-getters in a race may be of the same party resulting in only one party being represented on the November ballot. In one-third of the races for Governor in the last twenty-five years, I-872 would have resulted in two general election gubernatorial candidates from the same party.

Vote No on I-892

Initiative 892 is an attempt to deceive voters into voting yes on the greatest expansion of gambling in the State of Washington with the lure of a property tax refund. I-892 allows for the implementation of over 18,000 slot machines in neighborhood bars, bowling alleys, and restaurants. The miniscule cut in property taxes in no way makes up for this expansion into our neighborhoods.

The only ones who stand to win if this initiative passes are the gambling consortiums that have had a history of problems. It would be devastating to the Native American tribes that use the revenue toward the betterment of their communities. Slot machines are currently confined to just a few reservations. Initiative I-892 would greatly expand the use of these machines.

There is also the problem of gambling addiction. The approval of I-892 would undoubtedly increase the costs for treatment of gambling problems

Vote No on King County Charter Amendment—Yes on 1B

The King County Charter Amendment is a Tim Eyman attempt to intimidate local government(s). In this case, the initiative was started by jail guards (who hired Eyman) seeking retribution for council attempts to rein in the incessant growth of criminal justice expenditures (that effort has been largely successful).

The initiative would amend the county charter under which the unconstitutional Metro government was merged by voters into King County, creating a Metropolitan King County government with a 13-member legislative body to ensure adequate urban, suburban and rural representation. The initiative would decrease democratic representation by increasing the number of constituents in each council district from the current 140,000 (more than represented by three legislators) to 200,000 per member.

The entire legislative branch of the government currently accounts for less than 1/2 of 1% of the total King County budget. The marginal savings from eliminating four democratically elected representatives would solve no fiscal problems, but would drastically reduce oversight of the bureaucracy, the ability of members to solve constituent problems and serve in a regional role, and the access of citizens to their government.

Voting for option 1B would ensure that, should the council reduction initiative pass, there would be enough time for a redistricting commission to convene and rationally draw new council districts.

Vote No on Referendum 55

We have rejected charter schools twice because they would take money from all students to benefit just a few. They are run by private boards that are not publicly-elected like local school boards and statistics show that they do not deliver what they promise. We Don't Need Goo-Goos

Goo-Goos is what we call good-government types who forever tell us how to "fix" politics but who wouldn't ever participate in the process themselves. We have a long history of their advice –much of it making bad problems worse, not better.

The initiative was a goo-goo change. Looked good as an idea but look what it has done to our state. Eyman and company have figured how to use it to wreck our ability to govern the state. Goo-goos thought redistricting should be taken away from partisan legislators. Now an independent redistricting commission does the task. But the commission always decides not to draw lines that might cause any incumbent to lose. The result is a legislature where no member need ever fear losing to a challenger.

What goo-goo thought that we could take money out of politics? What government does is collect taxes to be spent on contracts and wages. It's a lot of money – billions and billions – so a lot of people have a big stake in who gets elected. What sane person believes that people who can make or lose millions depending on who wins wouldn't try to influence elections?

And now Initiative 872 supporters think we should switch to a primary that has been tried in only one state and is clearly worse than anything else. The top-two system they propose wouldn't produce better candidates – Louisiana got Edwin Edwards and David Duke, the top-two crooks for governor. Both later went to prison.

People generally don't like change and of course some don't like the new primary. But after they get used to it they'll find out it works just fine.

Remember that line about being careful, you just might get what you want? If I-872 passes you'll definitely be sorry.

Unless you think things have been getting better all the time.

Minutes of October 10 Meeting of the 34th District Democrats

The 34th District Chair, Kathy MINSCH, called the meeting to order. State Representative Joe MCDERMOTT led the Pledge of Allegiance. The minutes from the September business meeting and the agenda for the October meeting were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report-

Treasurer, Ann MARTIN, reported a balance through the end of August of \$18,334.00, noting this amount will change considerably as donations to campaigns are allocated.

Chair's Report-

She also announced that the annual reorganization meeting would be held in December of this year instead of January of 2005, to comply with the new state primary rules. Candidate for King County Superior Court Judge position 23, Julia GARRATT, introduced herself to the district and discussed her campaign. The 34th District Democrats already have endorsed her opponent, Andrea DARVAS.

Voter Registration Committee-

Committee co-chair, Steve KARBOWSKI, informed the District of key dates and events coming up for the Get Out the Vote initiatives. Volunteers and PCOs will be walking precincts on October 24th. The 34th District Democrats endorsed Chris Gregoire for Governor and Mary Kay Becker for State Supreme Court by acclamation.

Program- PRESENTATIONS

MONORAIL RECALL—Rep. Joe MCDERMOTT and Monorail Board Member, Cindi LAWS presented information against the Monorail Recall Initiative. A member of the Monorail Recall Campaign also presented in support of the Recall Initiative.

KING COUNTY CHARTER AMENDMENT—Scott WHITE, lead staff member for the Metropolitan King County Council, explained the initiative to reduce the size of the King County Council, highlighting that a reduction of the Council will disproportionately affect proportional representation to the King County government.

New Business (resumed)-

The District voted to reject the Monorail Recall Initiative I-83 and support the No Recall campaign. The motion passed 64/5.

The District voted to oppose the King County Charter Amendment, which would reduce the size of the county council; and also that opponents to the amendment should choose Option 1(B) to delay the implementation of the amendment should the amendment pass. The motion passed 57/3.

The District voted to oppose I-892, which would allow slot machines in non-tribal areas of the state. The motion was unanimously passed 63/0.

The District voted to oppose Referendum 55, which would create Charter Schools. The motion passed 63/1.

The District voted to donate to the following campaigns: \$500 to Chris Gregoire for Governor; \$500 to Deborah Senn for state Attorney General; \$750 to Mike Cooper for Commissioner of Public Lands; \$1500 to the state Senate Democratic Campaign Committee's Roosevelt Fund; \$1500 to the state House of Representatives Caucus Campaign; \$500 to Mary Kay Becker for state Supreme Court; \$500 to Cathy Moore for King County Superior Court position 42; \$200 to the Yes on I-297 [Hanford Cleanup Initiative]; \$400 to the No on I-872 [Cajun Primary Initiative]; \$200 to the No on I-892 [Slot Machine/Gambling Initiative]; \$400 to the No King County Charter Amendment campaign; \$500 to the No Monorail Recall campaign; \$4500 for Get Out the Vote [GOTV] initiatives; \$500 to the King County Democratic Central Committee for yearly dues; \$360 for three months hall rental; \$3000 for newsletters and postage for the remainder of the year; \$150 for meeting expenses; and \$500 for the annual 34th District Holiday Party. Total expenditures: \$16,860.00.
