KCDCC Meeting - September 25, 2019

At KCDCC this month, much was achieved. The group voted to endorse Mason Thompson for Bothell City Council, Barbara de Michele for Issaquah City Council, Carol Barber for Public Hospital District 1, Tam Dinh for Mercer Island School Board, Damiana Merryweather for Seatac City Coucil position 3, and Mohamed Egal for Seatac City Council position 7.

Chair Shasti Conrad reminded the group that there are many opportunities for canvassing, and encourages everyone to knock on doors.

We received an update from the DNC on the challenges in running a climate change focused Presidential Debate, the creation of a new DNC Environmental and Climate Council, and a resolution recommitting the DNC to upholding civil rights.

The Committee also voted to allocate just over \$3,000 to support candidates in the Seatac City Council races. With minority owned businesses being pushed out of a majority minority city, the committee felt that the contribution dollars were most needed in Seatac.

There were several committee reports.

The Infrastructure and Elections Committee is in need of help documenting KCDCC's history. If you have any materials (agendas, paperwork of any kind) from KCDCC, please forward that material to hanna.floss@gmail.com. Unfortunately, much of the organization's history was lost during a transition.

The Policy and Program Committee, led by our own Max Brown, reported on a fantastic Census event where 2/3 of the attendees were non party members. Great outreach! We can all look forward to future ballot parties in conjunction with canvases, and a lobbying training.

The communications committee is reaching out to young people on Instagram. They have over 400 followers, and you can be one if you follow @kingcountydems

The committee passed a number of resolutions.

The committee passed; a resolution opposing state initiative 976, a resolution condemning "Safe Seattle" as a hate group, a resolution opposing big money PAC influence in Seattle elections, a resolution opposing new and expanded gas infrastructure in Washington State, a resolution in support of the Seattle Urban Forestry Commission's Draft Tree and Urban Forest Protection Ordinance, and a resolution in support of restoring the state's overtime threshold.

In Case You Missed Our Last Meeting...

The September meeting began again with recognition of first-time attendees, and they were given the opportunity to rise to introduce themselves. One man from Burien came to the meeting after speaking with Nick Bonazza, who met him with canvassing. Highline School Board candidate Aaron Garcia, and several of his supporters also addressed us. And a gentleman, also from Burien, rose to inform us that he was attending his first political assembly since 1968.

In her Chair's Message, Gina Topp spoke about the work of several committees to revise our processes. Chris Porter is leading a group to update our Code of Conduct. Art Chippendale has taken charge of revamping our Bylaws, changes to which began to be contemplated last year. And Jordan Crawley is working to better define our procedures for presenting resolutions to the body. The final drafts of these committees are to be presented at our November meeting.

A program on homelessness was kicked off by Sofia Aragon. A two-person panel consisted of Robin Koskey, the Public Information Officer for the Seattle Office of Housing, and Daniel Malone, who is the Executive Director of the Downtown Emergency Services Center, gave the presentation.

Koskey presented what the city is doing to increase affordable housing and laid out a series of statistics. Overall about 35 percent of Seattle households are "cost burdened", meaning that they are spending more than 30% of their income on housing. Two-thirds of low-income households are so burdened, with 4 in 10 spending more than 50 percent on housing. Cost burdens are disproportionately borne by households of color. The current stock of 30,000 cost-restricted units is but a fraction of the need of such.

Mayor Durkin's plans includes:

 Using \$78 million from the sale of the city-owned "Mercer Mega Block" Properties in South Lake Union for housing purposes, such as acquiring property for affordable

development and providing loans for the construction of accessory dwelling units, i.e. backyard "mother-in-law" cottages.

- \$50 million for permanent supportive housing to serve the most vulnerable adults
- Permanently Affordable Homeownership through assistance to modest income families allowing them to purchase starter homes that when sold, will go to another low-income family.
- Updated Tenant Protections
- Multi-Family Tax Exemption Renewal that provides exemptions to developers to set aside a percentage of their properties for rent to low- and modest-income renters.

Malone's organization seeks to stabilize homeless with supportive housing, a "come as you are" low barrier approach. With housing, the individual is in a position solve substance abuse dependency or work get mental health issues addressed. DES operates 6 shelters and provides mental health services, with a crisis response team in the streets.

It was noted that homelessness was flat during the recession, and when rents started to rise with the improved economy, homelessness spiked. Rent control isn't possible until the state changes laws. Criminal records are a major hurtle, but studies have shown that once in stable housing, ex-offenders are no more likely to cause problems than the general population.

Sofia is a board member of the Washington Low Income Housing Alliance. She gave us a handout listing highlights of 2019 legislative wins:

- Money to build nearly 5,000 permanently affordable homes state-wide. Communities can have the option to retain local sales tax for affordable housing,
- The Housing and Essential Needs Program received the first rise in funding, and will go to help avoid displacement,
- Renters will have longer to catch up on late rent, and more notice prior to having rent raised.





 A bill to look at regulations that unnecessarily raise the cost of building affordable housing.

We also endorsed additional candidates for the General Election. Seattle's School Board election method allows us to vote for candidates in other districts and we were asked by 2 candidates for our endorsement. We endorsed Rebeca Muniz in the 3rd district, and Eric Blumhagen in the 1st. Aaron Garcia, running for a spot on the Highline School Board, was also endorsed.

A resolution in support of a draft tree and urban forest protection plan authored by Steve Zemke was presented and was passed. Jordan Crawley, our Legislative Action Committee Chair, provided us with background information. In the future he is planning to provide impartial information about the resolutions we vote on as part of resolution procedure updates to be announced in November.

Campaign donations of \$500 each was given to Burien City Council candidates Sofia Aragon and Kevin Schilling. After table group discussions, it was agreed that the money would go the furthest in those races.

I-976 Funding Impacts for King County

Initiative 976 repeals critical transportation funding, eliminating our ability to fix dangerous highways, retrofit bridges and overpasses, fund transit, build voter-approved projects, improve freight corridors, and invest in the Washington State Patrol.

Regional Projects at Risk

The Case to Approve I-1000/R88

Initiative 1000, which will appear on Washington's 2019 November ballot under Referendum 88 will restore fairness for veterans, small business owners, women, and people of color seeking to succeed in public employment, contracting, and university admissions – without the use of caps or quotas.

Why is the Approval of I-1000 / R-88 Important?

The 1998 passage of Tim Eyman's Initiative 200 made Washington one of only two states in the nation to explicitly ban outreach to historically marginalized communities to help determine outcomes in public education, contracting, and employment. The Approval of I-1000 via Referendum 88 would allow Washington to rejoin the 42 other states in the country that hold themselves accountable to creating more equitable outcomes for all citizens. Since 1998, Washington's most vulnerable communities have experienced serious and deleterious consequences with respect to access of public resources and educational opportunities:

According to the Washington's Office of Women and Minority Business Enterprises, since the passage of I-200, state spending with certified minority and woman-owned businesses has dropped from 10% to 3%, resulting in a devastating \$3.8 billion, 20-year loss of revenue.

Approve I-1000 / R88!

Since I-200 passed, diversity in Washington's public university and college populations has declined in proportion to the population as a whole. The number of Black, Native-American, and Pacific Islander students enrolled in all four-year public universities has decreased statewide.

How Would Approving I-1000/ R-88 Create Opportunities for all Washingtonians Succeed?

The Approval of I-1000/ R-88 would begin the process of reversing the inequitable trends resulting from the passage I-200. More economic opportunities would be afforded to veterans, small business owners, women, and people of color through public employment and contracting. The population of Washington's public universities would begin to better reflect the state as a whole. Finally, the passage of I-1000/ R-88 sends a critical message about how our shared values and beliefs should be codified into state law. We can take tangible, collective action to level the playing field for working families with the most urgent unmet needs, and we should strive to make Washington a place where someone's race, ethnicity, gender, or other status isn't a generational determinant of their ability to thrive or share equitably in the prosperity afforded to our region.

Prop. 1, Proposed Public Hospital District No. 5 - Vashon Island

Vashon's current clinic isn't financially viable and will not be able to continue to operate on the island. Without a public funding mechanism, island residents could lose local access to health care.

The public hospital district is a tool for funding ongoing care for the island. The taxes collected from the island would be spent only on island care. Over 60 other communities in Washington have created hospital districts to provide sustainable funding for their local health care services.

By approving Proposition 1, Proposed Public Hospital District No. 5, island voters will:

Keep a clinic open and available to all;

Provide services better aligned with island needs;

Safeguard the quality of life for seniors, children and vulnerable populations.

If the island loses local health care access, they risk losing the seniors, families and businesses in the community. They lose local jobs and the services they support. They lose critical time in a health care emergency, and the convenience of staying onisland for non-life-threatening injuries or care.

The Public Hospital District is already supported by our legislative delegation.
