What Should we Look for in a Chair?

Fellow PCOs and members of the 34th District Democrats.

In 10 days we will come together to reorganize as required by the Revised Code of Washington and the charter of the Washington State Democratic Party. This communication is aimed primarily at the PCOs elected in August who will elect our new chair (as well as vice chairs and delegates to the county and state party central committees), but will be useful to all members of the organization who may attend our regular monthly business meetings.

We are Democrats, members of the Democratic Party, and we believe in democracy, fairness, and inclusion. As a deliberative body, we follow a set of rules and customs together known as parliamentary law. The following is adapted from Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised as well as The Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure by Alice Sturgis as revised by the American Institute of Parliamentarians. I hope you will find it helpful as you think about who to support for chair at the reorganization meeting on January 9th.

Parliamentary Law is the Bedrock of Democracy

The customs and rules of parliamentary law are the bedrock of democracy and the mechanism by which a group of people can make fair and equitable decisions. Parliamentary law protects the individual and the group in their exercise of the rights of free speech, free assembly, and the freedom to unite in organizations for the achievement of common aims. The rules of parliamentary law are based on a regard for the rights of:

- · the majority,
- the minority, especially a strong minority—greater than one third,
- Individual members,
- · absentees, and
- · all of these together

The most important decision we have to make on January 9th is the election of our new chair, so it's important to make sure we have a common understanding of what the role of the chair is and what makes a good chair.

The Role of the Chair

The role of chair requires a special combination of talents, and as this role is crucial to a well-functioning organization it demands our fullest consideration. A chair has three primary roles—leader, administrator, and presiding officer. Each calls for different abilities.

Every two years all Democratic Party Organizations in Washington elect new officers and appoint new committee chairs. While any Democrat is welcome to attend, only PCOs elected in the August, 2018, primary election can vote for most officers, but all 2019 members can vote for Treasurer and Secretary (see our by-laws, Article IV, Section 2). Although it is preferred that PCOs pay some level of membership dues, it isn't a requirement for elected PCOs to vote. Renewing members who are NOT PCOs must pay 2019 membership dues in order to vote - you can do so online or at the meeting. Proxy voting is not allowed.

Chair as Leader

There are fundamental qualities that most good leaders of an organization possess. One is the *ability to plan*—to sense what the members want and help them crystallize their ideas. Another is the *ability to unite*—to rally members behind a plan and behind their leader. Perhaps the most important is the *courage to win*—to overcome all obstacles. A good leader works with the members, and keeps them happy while they are working. Such a leader has power *with* people, not *over* them. An organization is not merely a group of people working toward a common aim. It is also a powerful medium through which members can realize their individual hopes. A competent leader forges ahead toward the collective goal, but is not blind to individual aims.

Chair as Administrator

The most important duties of the chair as administrator are:

- 1. Act as chief administrative officer and legal head of the organization
- 2. Exercise supervision over the organization and all its activities and volunteers
- 3. Represent and speak for the organization to other organizations and the public
- 4. Preside at business meetings
- 5. Appoint committees
- 6. Sign letters or documents necessary to carry out the will of the organization
- 7. Preside at meetings of the board

Chair as Presiding Officer

As presiding officer the chair is the leader and representative of the entire assembly. Respect for this position is respect for the organization. The chair must maintain firm control of the meeting, yet always act primarily as the "first servant of the assembly." The chair must exercise wide discretion in a meeting, meeting each situation with flexibility and judgment, common sense, and fairness to all members, acting always impartially and in good faith. A presiding officer must be firm and decisive, yet not dictatorial; courteous and patient, yet alert to ensure progress. Presiding is an art that cannot be learned entirely from a book. A tactful presiding officer knows how to discourage courteously a member who talks too much or too often and how to encourage a shy member who speaks only when compelled by strong convictions. When an assembly is restive, a good presiding officer knows how to shorten discussion and how to make business move along, but senses when members are confused and when business should move more slowly. Above all, a good presiding officer must have a working knowledge of parliamentary procedure and how to apply it.

These are some of the key things we should all keep in mind as we decide who to support for chair of the 34th District Democrats. We want to elect a chair who will enable the will of the majority while respecting the minority and ensuring their voices are heard. We want to elect a chair who will help us realize our aims as an organization while enabling individuals to realize their dreams. Above all, we want to elect a chair who will be fair, who we can trust to listen to all voices and use the rules of parliamentary law never as a weapon, but solely in the interests of empowering our members to what we're all here to do: elect Democrats and spread Democratic values.
